NAIDOC week celebrated

As part of our activities for NAIDOC week 2011 we had our assembly on Monday 27th June. The assembly was hosted by James Bridges and Joshua Falzdeen.

The traditional custodians of the land, the Cadigal people were acknowledged before Mrs. Kokkalis spoke of her youth and the lack of information about indigenous people that was in the History syllabus. It was not until the 1980's that students began to learn of the richness of Aboriginal culture and history.

The theme for this year's celebrations is "CHANGE—the next step is ours." Mrs Kokkalis pointed out that while in the past 30 years a lot has been done to address the injustices of the past, there is still more to achieve and it ca only be done with effort from the coming generations.

NAIDOC Week is an opportunity to recognise and celebrate the achievements of the indigenous population, and we were delighted to have as our special guest speaker the honourable Linda Burney, member for Canterbury and New South Wales Deputy Opposition Leader. She gave an inspiring talk about the challenges she faced as a young Aboriginal woman growing up in the Riverina. The sole aboriginal student in her class, she was made to feel inferior to everyone around her. However she realised that with education came empowerment and she reminded the Assembly of the importance of education in creating a positive path for the future for young people.


She then asked the Assembly who they knew of as famous indigenous people. Not surprisingly, many were NRL footballers. But she then pointed out that many Aboriginal people who have achieved great things in our society, have done so across a variety of experiences and backgrounds.

Joshua Staines Year 10 showed his talent and played the didgeridoo

for the occasion. Robert Bridges and Baden Barton Year 7 gave a very emotional poetry reading which reflected on the importance of change. The assembly was completed by the rap artists known as Stunna set. The audience enjoyed the assembly and had a greater understanding of the importance of change and working

together toward a better future for Aboriginal people.

All I can say is that it was one of the best productions I have seen and I am not a Beckett fan. The boys were amazing: they were exceptionally talented, inspiring, and brilliant. I could go on but many of you will think I am biased. Those parents who found the time to attend also noted how wonderful they were. I guess like everything with teaching if you have a passionate, dedicated teacher like Ms Museth, then all is possible.

I commend Ms Museth and the boys for their commitment and hard work, cannot wait to see what is in store next vear.

Early in the term I was invited to visit Vietnam, with Ms Elizabeth Webber, Manager of the International programs for DEC. Our task was to attend the Education Expo, with other education representatives from Australia and met agents, staff and students where we shared our teaching methods and presented an overview of our education programs for international students.

Pedestrian safety
on Liverpool Road
Pedestrian safety on Liverpool Road in the heart
of Ashfield's CBD has long been an issue for all
road users. The combination of the mall, shops,
schools and the train station make this a busy
hub, particularly in peak travel times. Cars are
delayed in traffic and pedestrians often cross mid
block.
A recent crash analysis by the RTA confirmed this
significant safety issue. In the five year period
analysed (from January 2005 until December
2009), there were 69 crashes along this stretch of
road, 19 involving pedestrians. Half of the affected
pedestrians were crossing mid block away from
the existing crossing facilities. Across the whole
LGA during this same time, 135 pedestrians were

2009), there were 69 crashes along this stretch of road, 19 involving pedestrians. Half of the affected pedestrians were crossing mid block away from the existing crossing facilities. Across the whole LGA during this same time, 135 pedestrians were injured or killed.

In response to these alarming numbers, the RTA and Ashfield Council teamed up to address the issue through engineering, environmental and educational perspectives.

Over the coming months, with the support of the DET, RTA and Ashfield Council, Ashfield Boys students and teachers will be involved in an integrated road safety program encompassing different curriculum areas such as Graphic Art, PDHPE and English. Students will have the opportunity to examine local road safety issues and consider ways graphic art and visual literacy can be used to spread an important message about pedestrian safety. As part of the project, teaching and learning programs will also be updated to include the latest pedestrian safety resources.



dTpa injections with a second Hepatitis B injection on October the 25th. Year 10 students were offered the dTpa injection on the 21st of June.

2012 and beyond

As Term 3 approaches, so too does the need to consider what direction students wish to take for the future. Subject Selection for Year 11, 2012 will be held next Term and the Job Guide information can be used to help with this process.

TVET Courses for 2012

TAFE offers courses which can be studied as part of the HSC, and in some cases also used for University entry. Booklets outlining the many courses and locations for

2012 are now available.

Work Experience - Year 10

Work Experience is no longer compulsory, nor is it a time to simply make some pocket money or get part time employment, but should be seen as an integral part of the total learning experience.

There are also opportunities in Yrs 11 and 12 for students to use the program to explore the world of work and research future directions.

Students are able to undertake up to 3 weeks in the workplace, if there is a perceived need.

This could be with one employer and used as a means of deciding on apprenticeships, or it could be with a few employers checking out different possibilities.

The agreed time for Year 10 is after the School Certificate exams and before the end of the year.

Year 11 and 12 students may undertake Work experience at any time convenient to the employer, provided it does not conflict with Assessment Tasks.

Before a placement is approved the employer must be checked for OH&S compliance and that their workplace is a safe and appropriate environment for a student.

2011 is the first year that AIME has hosted a Learning Centre at The National Centre of Indigenous Excellence (NCIE) in Redfern for all Indigenous students from AIME schools to attend, of which there are 8 in the Sydney City area! Each Friday afternoon, volunteer USYD mentors travel to The NCIE learn from and offer Indigenous high school students access to one-on-one tutoring, cultural workshops & sports activities to finish off the school week.

In May 2011, a group of Ashfield Boys' HS Indigenous students have made history..

Here's what Ben Bowen, a young Indigenous university student and AIME's Sydney City Program Manager has to say about the young men from Ashfield:

"I feel extremely lucky to have the chance to work with the Ashfield Boys in 2010 and in 2011. It is really promising to see such a strong group of young Indigenous leaders who are set to take Ashfield Boys into the future"

AIME's Interactive and Leadership Programs for Year 9 & 10 students have also been smashing records and stereotypes this year with the Ashfield students stepping up week after week with their Mentors to the challenges AIME sets.

"Joshua and James in Year 9 have really shown their intentions with their academic and leadership future. Both boys have made his own way over on a Friday to participate in the AIME Learning Centre and have been working to recruit more Ashfield Boys students to travel as a group to the ALC" Ben Bowen said.

The AIME Learning Centre (ALC) operates from **3:30-5:00pm each Friday** at The NCIE at **180 George St Redfern** and is **open to <u>all</u> Indigenous students** from Ashfield Boys' High School grades 7-12 and their mates.



SANCTIONED ITEMS

If you bring the following items to school:

It is your responsibility to look after your money and/or electronic devices, and if they are lost or taken the school will not compensate for their loss.

If any Mobile phones, CD players, Discmans, electronic games, MP3 players, IPods or any other personal sound systems are brought to school and used inappropriately and disrupt learning they will be confiscated and returned at a later date.

DANGEROUS / INAPPROPRIATE ITEMS:

At Ashfield Boys High School we pride ourselves on having a safe learning environment. Therefore, we do not allow the following items at school:

- Fireworks
- Knives, including craft knives and toys as well as actual knives
- Weapons of any kind, including toy guns, pellets, replica weapons
- Drugs legal and illegal; substances passed off as drugs
- Sharp objects; laser pointers
- Inappropriate readings, writings or drawings, downloading of inappropriate or censored material from the internet

Students found in possession of dangerous items may be suspended.

The items will be confiscated and will be referred to the police.

The Department of School Education expects schools to take very seriously any situation where students or staff feel they are unsafe or where the learning of other students is disrupted. Schools must involve the Police if a student brings a knife or other weapon to school (including toys and replicas) or an illegal substance (this includes passing a substance off as an illegal substance).

HIGH RESOLVES INITIATIVE

~ COLLECTIVE IDENTITY ~

The High Resolves Initiative was introduced to all Year 8 students on the 23rd and 24th of May 2011 in the Library. High Resolves is a not-for-profit, non-religious organisation which has partnerships with universities in NSW and Victoria. The program is now on its second year in Ashfield Boys' High School with Mr Lee Martin from High Resolves facilitating the program.

This module is a fun, interactive and inspirational experience in which high school students learn new skills, stretch their minds and meet other people who are passionate about making a difference to the world and having their voice heard. The High Resolves Initiative comprises a Global Citizenship Program for Year 8 students and also a Global Leadership Program for some Year 9 students in

2012. The Global Citizenship Program involves participation in two full day sessions covering the concepts of Collective Identity and Justice.

The first session, Collective Identity was held on 23 – 24 May 2011. The aim of this session was to enable students to develop skills that allow them to recognise, critically evaluate and challenge divisive messages and also explore what it means to be a global citizen.

The modules on Collective Identity included an initial training session for the

Yr 9 and Yr 10 leaders who helped facilitate the Year 8 students during the two days. The Year 8 students were pre-assigned to groups of 10 with 2 Group Leaders from Year 9 and 10 students.
