
YEAR 7 TOLSTOY ENGLISH


YEAR 10 ENGINEERING -ROBOTICS PROJECT




Our Year 10 Engineering class is currently finishing their Robotic projects for this semester.



AUSTRALIAN BUSINESS WEEK MANUFACTURING SIMULATION – SPORTING GOODS

Year 10 students from Ashfield Boys High School and Canterbury Girls High School joined together to participate in the Australian Business Week (ABW) program. This is the fourth year that our schools have come together to compete in ABW and it was another successful year.







Students from both schools were amalgamated to form Business teams and were supplied with takeover financials including a current share price for their business. In their Business teams students appointed CEO's, Financial, Operations and Marketing teams to run their business over the week. They named their Business, decided on an innovative product to develop and sell, both domestically and globally.







Over the course of the week, teams were required to make 8 decisions on things such as how much inventory to produce, prices for both domestic and global markets and how much product would be sold in each market. They had to decide on how much to spend on wages, advertising, payment of dividends and employee bonuses. Each decision is then put into a simulation program and provides the teams with new financial reports and the effect their decisions had on their share price. This process is repeated over the course of the week with share prices going up and down depending on their decisions.

Students also prepared business stationery, commercials, final company reports and a trade display for their business. Along the way teams also participated in several team building activities.
