## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### Ashfield Boys identified as a high performing school

If your son is in Year 11 or 12, he tells you that his classes have been observed and that his teacher has been filmed, he is correct. We have had researchers from the Centre for Educational Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) visiting the school over the past month as part of a research study. CESE have identified 5 schools across NSW that displayed extremely high and sustained HSC performance from 2014 – 2018 and we are one if the sites. The research team are looking specifically at the extremely high performance of the English and Maths courses for the period and what has led to this success.

It is a wonderful affirmation of the school that we have been identified as a site of high performance in the HSC over an extended period. This is something that all of us, the boys, teachers and parents should be proud of as we all contribute to this success. It is great to have an independent study quantitatively and statistically validate Ashfield Boys as a high performing school.

Next week is Year 12s final one of their school education. On Thursday we will hold the three part celebration of this milestone - the informal BBQ breakfast, the Graduation Ceremony and the Formal in the evening. It would be great to see as many parents of Year 12 as possible at the Graduation Ceremony. 






## **CONGRATULATIONS TO DYLAN DONNINI OF YEAR 9**

## Young Justice Program Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> September, 2019



The Year 11 Legal Studies class was delighted to be invited to participate in the Law Society of NSW Young Justice Program. Students Jeremy Lawrence, Andy Vo, Mahdi Saleh, Jake Donnelly, Jordan Ddibya, Ershad Rashidi, Mehmet Ayata and Aaron Chandra attended.

The day began with an impressive keynote address by HH Magistrate Elizabeth Ellis and continued with workshops on sentencing considerations, legal literacy and careers.

Students were given a trial sentencing scenario from which to create a submission to The Honourable Justice Terry Buddin, SC. Maurice Tran and Mahdi Saleh represented their team for the defence and Jordan Ddibya and Ershad Rashidi theirs for the prosecution. Both groups did a great job responding to the scenario and they received valuable feedback from HH Buddin who commented on the excellent team-work shown by Ashfield students.

All participants engaged wholeheartedly with the program and their attitude to all aspects of learning was outstanding. It was a wonderful opportunity to experience another fascinating aspect of Legal Studies!

















## **SCIENCE: UTS EXCURSION**

Year 10 Students were invited to UTS for a whole day excursion to experience the life of an undergraduate student in the discipline of Chemistry, Physiology and Forensic.







Students learnt how to use various pieces of equipment like electrocardiogram (ECG) and spirometer and examined different forensic techniques like chemical analysis, evidence preservation, fingerprinting and blood ballistics that are used to solve crime.




























Amount of times the movie genres appear in the top 100 most grossing films in 2018




This frequency distribution table shows us that through the use of mode, we can find that Action was the most popular genre in 2018, as it had the most movies in the top 100 highest grossing films out of any genre. Also by finding the median and average, being 15 and 14, it tells us that the data set is more or less evenly distributed from the lowest to highest values.



The interquartile range for this data is 12, which shows that there is a outlier in this data, which is the musical genre that only has 4 movies in the top 100 movies in 2018. This tells us that this genre is the least popular genre out of the top 100 movies analysed.



The mean of this data is 14, this tells us, that if every movie was equal in popularity, it would be at 14%. This shows that action and adventure are by far the most popular genre's in 2018. This pie chart also shows us easily the most popular to the least popular genres, being from most to least popular, action, adventure, comedy, drama, horror, thriller and musical.



This graph shows us that this data is positively skewed as most of the data is on the left-hand side of the distribution which also better reveals the outlier, being the musical genre, with only 4 movies being in that genre out of the 100 analysed. Also by finding the range, being 20, it helps for us to better understand that range is not as accurate as the interquartile range as when finding the range I included the musical genre which is an outlier, where as an interquartile range is not affected by an outlier as much as the range is

In conclusion, the data I have analysed shows that the action genre, was indeed the most popular genre in 2018, closely followed by the adventure genre. This is most likely as the action and adventure genre's are very similar to each other as well as being one of the most used genres when it comes to making movies. The data also tells us that the thriller and horror genre's are equally liked as they both have 9 movies that are in the top 100 movies of 2018. This is probably because, like the action and adventure genre's, the horror and thriller genre's are also both very similar in terms of the kind of movie made, with the data found further telling us how similar they really are. The data also tells us that the musical genre is the least popular out of the 7 genres and tells us that it is one of the least used genres and is nowhere near as liked as genre's such as action and adventure.
























# YEAR 10 ENGINEERING STUDENTS IN ACTION: HYDRO POWER PROJECTS


Hydropower is an attractive energy source because it is renewable and clean. Renewable energy is commonly understood to come from the wind, sun and movement of water. Clean energy commonly refers to energy sources that do not significantly emit toxins and greenhouse gases.

Worldwide, hydroelectric power plants produce about 24% of the world's electricity and supply more than one billion people with power. Engineers are involved in many aspects of hydropower. Engineers design, build and operate dams and their hydropower units. Engineers also work on improving design and maximizing energy generation.









Year 10 Engineering students explore kinetic energy by creating their own experimental waterwheels from plastic cups, bottles or any other items. They investigate the transformations of energy involved in turning the blades of a hydro-turbine and experiment with how weight affects the rotational rate of the waterwheel. They learn the history of the waterwheel, common uses for water turbines today and the characteristics of hydroelectric plants.

On Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> September, Year 10 attended bstreesmart at Qudos Bank Arena. The event is the initiative of the Trauma Service at Westmead Hospital. Westmead's Trauma Service is constantly reminded, through their hands on work, that young people aged between 15–30 are disproportionally represented in road trauma. In response to this, the bstreetsmart event is a series of powerful talks, re-enactments and workshops designed to reduce the fatality and injury rates of young people by promoting safe behaviour as drivers, riders and passengers. The feedback from the boys was very positive and many came back with a more sober understanding of the risks associated with young people on the roads.
